# **KNOW THY SURROUNDINGS**

To truly know our surroundings, we must first knock down the walls between ourselves and the outside world (not literally though, that would get you in a lot of trouble). We must leave our rooms and familiarize ourselves with nature. We must learn how our actions as young anglers affect the world around us.

## **KNOW THY SURROUNDINGS**

**The Watershed** is the land and water pathways leading to the ocean. Ever notice the way rain runs off your roof into a gutter, then down a water spout eventually soaking into the ground? Well the watershed is like Earth's roof.

Water that soaks into soil reaches creeks, canals, and other pathways that flow to large bodies of water like coastal estuaries, rivers and eventually, the Ocean.

Things we do on land affect the quality water. Run off water will absorb parts of the soil and other pollutants we have on land, so please, be careful and clean up.



**The Mangroves** are a very special place here in Florida. They grow where the water is **brackish**, or a mixture of salt water and fresh water. They are home to many species of fish, as they provide shelter like no other place on Earth.

Not only do they protect marine life, but they also protect the shore lines from erosion. But their numbers are growing thin. As an Enlightened Angler, you'll have the **power** to make a difference. Let's take a look at how AFC can help us create mangroves, one of Florida's biggest contributors to healthy marine life.



#### Oysters

While our grumpy friend may not be all that attractive, he does have a point. Oysters are a KEYSTONE species, meaning they play a pivotal role in the ecosystem.


Oysters improve the quality of life in their estuaries by filtering about one and a half gallons of water each hour. They are also considered an INDICATOR species, as they indicate the overall health of the ecosystem.

# KNOW THY OPPONENT

D) Pectoral Fin	E) Pelvic Fin	F) Anal Fin


# **KNOW THY TOOLS**

The Enlightened Angler prepares both mentally and physically before embarking on a fishing adventure.

Our first tool is the ruler. The ruler allows us to measure fish so that we know how big they are, allowing us to brag to our friends or quickly throw them back before anyone notices.

# RIGGING

You are doing great on your journey! You have acquired a vast amount of **knowledge**. Now we need to put it to good use.

Proper rigging makes fishing more fun. Don't lose hooks...or fish! Strong knots, like the improved clinch knot explained on the next page, are great to use to help keep hooks on the line.

A strong knot keeps fish from running off with your hooks (as they love to do), and also helps prevent you from losing a hook if you get snagged on something. Wetting your knot while you tie it helps get it as tight as possible from the beginning.


And as always, remember to be a responsible angler by cleaning up any mess you leave behind.

# FISHING SAFETY

The Enlightened Angler is all about safety. It is important to get a feel for your surroundings.

1. Are there other people near by? Look first!

2. Are there birds near by that will go after your bait or get tangled in your line?

3. Are your hooks barbless or are the barbs flattened?

4. Are you prepared to properly discard used line? Fishing line is dangerous!




This pelican is not having a good day. Discarded fishing line is more than just an eye-sore, some animals get entangled in it and can't escape, others choke on it. That's bad karma, and discarding fishing line in an improper manner will not help you along the path to enlightenment. Make sure to put any fishing line into your line discard container when you're done using it to recycle later. Mother Nature will be pleased - and believe me, you don't want to be on her bad side!

## SAFE CASTING

Stand up straight. Be aware of your surroundings.

> Check behind you for other people or obstacles before setting up for your cast.




Cast overhead and in a straight line in front of you. Keep your eye on the spot in which you want your cast to land.

Don't cast sideways.

Don't cast with your eyes closed.

Don't try to do stunts while casting. This always ends up with bad results.

DON'TS



No, no, no - you've got it all wrong, Gil. Finn's just fine ... well he was a minute ago anyway.

(He should be ok)

**CPR** stands for **Catch, Photo, Release**. It's a fishing practice that minimizes our impact (or footprint) on the environment.

You don't have to keep your large catches as trophies. A simple photo does just fine.



You see, by pulling all the large fish out of a fishing spot, you're throwing off the balance of the ecosystem in that lake or body of water. Bigger fish have more babies, and it takes years for fish to grow to "trophy size." By pulling all the big guys out, that just leaves a lake full of smaller fish. By practicing **CPR**, you are helping to preserve a proper, balanced ecosystem and allowing other anglers to enjoy the same great fishing you do.


By understanding the importance of conservation, you are attaining a higher level of **Wisdom**.

#### **3-BREATH RULE!**

That means try not to keep the fish out of water longer than 3 breaths.

It's just good manners.

## **BOATING SAFETY**

Boats are big and powerful, that's what makes them so much fun. But since they are so big, you must use extra caution when you're around them. Stay in a designated area, clear of the boat, as it is being lowered down the ramp. If you are six or younger, make sure you are wearing your life-preserver at all times when near the water, such as on the dock or boat.

#### **BOATING RULES**


- Stay with a family member or friend at all times while at the boat ramp.
- When in boat, keep hands and feet inside the boat and always listen to and obey the captain.
- Don't sit on the boat's bow when the motor's running. Always stay seated when departing or arriving at the boat ramp.
- Remember to wear sun protection.
- If you can't swim, learn how.
- Wear your life-preserver!



Sunscreen protects you from the sun's dangerous UV rays - which can cause skin damage before you even know it is happening.



Also remember the safety of marine life and underwater environment when boating. Be mindful of the impact of your boat's propeller and anchor on seagrass, manatees, and more!





Here's a good way to practice your three R's, and gain yourself a great tool in the process. You can make your own line discard container out of any old plastic canister by simply having your parents (or local brain surgeon) cut a small "X" into the lid. Then you can push line in and it won't come back out until you're ready to recycle it later.

You can recycle monofilament fishing line at a local tackle shop or at outdoor PVC recycling bins at fishing piers, parks and boat ramps. What should you feed me if you see me out on one of your fishing or boating adventures?


